OBJECTIVE

This presentation explores a critical question at the heart of Texas' mid-decade redistricting efforts: How many registered voters are affected by the Legislature's PLAN C2333, and where are they being moved?

By examining the number of registered voters in Harris County precincts as of September 2, 2025—based on the post-2020 Census Redistricting Plan C2193—and analyzing how those precincts are reassigned under PLAN C2333, this presentation helps contextualize the scale of the voter shifts caused by the enacted 2025 redistricting plan.



Texas Congressional District 2 (CD2), Under PlanC2333

- **75% of the post 2020 Census registered voters districted to CD 2 will remain in the district**
- 17% of the post 2020 Census registered voters districted to CD2 will move to CD9.
- 7% of the post 2020 Census registered voters districted to CD2 will move to CD29.
- 1% of the post 2020 Census registered voters districted to CD 2 will move to CD38.


In Congressional District 2, where are post-Census 2020 districted (280,173) reg. voters being apportioned under TX PlanC2333?



Texas Congressional District 7 (CD7), Under PlanC2333

- **77% of the post 2020 Census registered voters districted to CD7 will remain in the district**
- 21% of the post 2020 Census registered voters districted to CD7 will move to CD8.
- 2% of the post 2020 Census registered voters districted to CD7 will move to CD38.
- Two voters or 0% of the post 2020 Census registered voters districted to CD7 will move to CD29.


In Cong Dist 7, where are post-Census 2020 districted (295,967) reg. voters being apportioned under TX PlanC2333?



Texas Congressional District 8 (CD8), Under PlanC2333

- **59% of the post 2020 Census registered voters districted to CD8 will remain in the district**
- 27% of the post 2020 Census registered voters districted to CD8 will move to CD38.
- 14% of the post 2020 Census registered voters districted to CD8 will move to CD22.


In Congressional District 8, where are post-Census 2020 districted (255,334) reg. voters being apportioned under TX PlanC2333?



Texas Congressional District 9 (CD9), Under PlanC2333

- **3% of the post 2020 Census registered voters districted to CD9 will remain in the district**
- 75% of the post 2020 Census registered voters districted to CD9 will move to CD18.
- 17% of the post 2020 Census registered voters districted to CD9 will move to CD7.
- 5% of the post 2020 Census registered voters districted to CD9 will move to CD36.


In Congressional District 9, where are post-Census 2020 districted (257,470) reg. voters being apportioned under TX PlanC2333?



Texas Congressional District 18 (CD18), Under PlanC2333

- **28% of the post 2020 Census registered voters districted to CD18 will remain in the district**
- 51% of the post 2020 Census registered voters districted to CD18 will move to CD29.
- 9% of the post 2020 Census registered voters districted to CD18 will move to CD7.
- 9% of the post 2020 Census registered voters districted to CD18 will move to CD2.
- 3% of the post 2020 Census registered voters districted to CD18 will move to CD38.


In Congressional District 18, where are post-Census 2020 districted (414,853) reg. voters being apportioned under TX PlanC2333?



Texas Congressional District 29 (CD29), Under PlanC2333

- **34% of the post 2020 Census registered voters districted to CD29 will remain in the district**
- 43% of the post 2020 Census registered voters districted to CD29 will move to CD9.
- 11% of the post 2020 Census registered voters districted to CD29 will move to CD18.
- 8% of the post 2020 Census registered voters districted to CD29 will move to CD36.
- 4% of the post 2020 Census registered voters districted to CD29 will move to CD7.


In Congressional District 29, where are post-Census 2020 districted (333,581) reg. voters being apportioned under TX PlanC2333?



Texas Congressional District 36 (CD36), Under PlanC2333

- **50% of the post 2020 Census registered voters districted to CD36 will remain in the district**
- 50% of the post 2020 Census registered voters districted to CD29 will move to CD9.


In Congressional District 36, where are post-Census 2020 districted (260,821) reg. voters being apportioned under TX PlanC2333?



Texas Congressional District 38 (CD38), Under PlanC2333

- **80% of the post 2020 Census registered voters districted to CD38 will remain in the district**
- 11% of the post 2020 Census registered voters districted to CD38 will move to CD2.
- 4% of the post 2020 Census registered voters districted to CD38 will move to CD8.
- 2% of the post 2020 Census registered voters districted to CD38 will move to CD7
- 2% of the post 2020 Census registered voters districted to CD38 will move to CD22.
- 1% of the post 2020 Census registered voters districted to CD38 will move to CD29.

In Congressional District 38, where are post-Census 2020 districted (516,751) reg. voters being apportioned under TX PlanC2333?
